Operating Revenues











Operating Revenues

Cooperative Report, as reported by CEO, Cheryl Rue

"Good evening and welcome to our 59th Annual Meeting. I want to extend a warm welcome to all members and thank our new members joining us and participating in the Annual Meeting for their first time. We have 478 registered members participating in the Annual Meeting either virtually or by the call-in option. The virtual Annual Meeting has given us the opportunity to reach a broader audience of our membership. As a reminder, those who have joined us virtually or have called in, will receive a \$25 bill credit for an attendance gift on their May 1st billing statement.

Our membership grew by 495 or nearly 6% ending the year 9,285 members strong. In 2022, we ended the year with 15,075 revenue generating units of which there were: 2,852 voice units, 3,582 CATV units and 8,641 Internet units. Due to the shift from traditional CATV to video streaming, we have seen over a 5% decline in CATV subscribers. As people migrate to other platforms to view their video content, the growth in Internet subscribers has grown by 621 or 7.7%. Over the years we have seen CATV programming prices continually rise more than the Consumer Price Index. CATV rates for 2023 increased accordingly at \$7 per month to cover the programming costs. Video programming continues to be one of the largest expenses of the cooperative and has grown to over \$4.2 million in fees for the year. These pass-through fees are turned over directly to the video programming companies. TCC is now moving into a streaming CATV platform offering. You will be hearing more on our video streaming through our website and future newsletters. This past year, the bandwidth usage on our Internet backbone increased by 30% with the additional Internet subscribers and streaming-only options of programming including some NFL games. The cooperative has worked hard to ensure all members are enjoying the highest broadband speeds through our fiber optic network. The services we provide are critical to the well-being of our members and their communities. We understand the advantages and opportunities that gigabit broadband speeds and a high-capacity fiber optic network brings to our rural communities.

TCC is expanding into underserved competitive territories with State grants, partnerships and TCC capital. In the spring of 2021, TCC was awarded WIS-PSC Broadband Expansion Grants for expansion into the Town of Drammen in Eau Claire County and Newcomb Valley, near Arcadia in Trempealeau County. Both areas have been completed and we are happy to be serving members in those areas. In the fall of 2021, TCC was awarded WI-PSC-ARPA Expansion Grants for the Town of Naples in Buffalo County and the Town of Alma in Jackson County. Services are currently being connected in the Town of Naples. In the Town of Alma, we are currently building out the network and look forward to providing services to that area as well. In July of 2022, TCC was awarded a WI-PSC Broadband Expansion Grant to connect subscribers in the Town of Pleasant Valley in Eau Claire County. Construction in this area will start in this construction year.

On Friday, December 30th, TCC sold the TCC Business office building to Central Builders Supply of Independence. This was the office on the east side of the original TCC customer service office. Our customer service team has moved back to the west side of the building at the same location. When we originally purchased that portion of the building from Independence State Bank, we had envisioned having a retail presence for computers, televisions, monitoring etc. in addition to being a Verizon Wireless agent. Over time, with the growth of ecommerce, we simply didn't have the scope and scale to be competitive in that retail area and decided to sell the building. We look forward to continuing to serve you in Independence.

Network security is a complicated but important subject. TCC's management has a well-trained staff that takes every preventative measure available to protect the integrity of our network and data. We continue to develop a comprehensive, company-wide plan to manage our cyber risks and ensure our network is resistant to and resilient from cyber attacks. Continuing education of our staff is key in our risk management to guard against new threats. It is imperative that we keep the very lifeline of our business and your services secure.

Reports of scamming and cyber attacks circulate daily. Protect yourself by setting strong passwords and changing them often, keeping your operating system, browser, and anti-virus software up to date to help in guarding yourself against fraudulent activity. Always verify the authenticity of requests from companies or individuals by contacting them directly. Earlier in the video before the meeting, you were given a peek at the new look of our TCC logo. Please stay tuned as we begin to share our Purpose, Mission, and Vision Statement in the upcoming days. On behalf of the board of directors and employees it's an honor and a privilege to serve our membership. President Carlisle called upon the Cooperative's legal counsel, Attorney Dustin Von Ruden, to report the results for the director elections. Attorney Von Ruden reported that Aaron Kidd was elected director for the Blair/Taylor/Alma Center/Hixton/Merrillan District, and that Thomas Goller was elected director for the Galesville/Ettrick/Trempealeau/Centerville District. President Carlisle then called for a vote to accept the director election results. A vote was held electronically. Motion carried.
